Preface

This is a book about the great cultural awakening that is taking place in the world—an awakening that is opening the doors to a cultural age.

I have been thinking about such an awakening ever since I was very young. It all began when my grade six teacher asked me to give a presentation to my classmates at school. After a great deal of searching, I decided to talk about Macro Polo and his trip to China many centuries ago. I was fascinated by his journey along the historic Silk Road through what are now Turkey, Iran, Iraq, Afghanistan, and Pakistan, as well as his experiences in China and elsewhere in Asia, including the several missions to India, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, and Burma (now Myanmar) that he carried out as an emissary of the great Kublai Khan. Over the course of his travels, Marco Polo met many different kinds of people, ate many different types of foods, and enjoyed superb banquets and festivities in the courts of Kublai Khan and other rulers. The terrain he covered, the many different tribes, clans, and peoples he encountered along the way, the numerous places he visited—all these captivated me immensely, as I believe they have many other people. The very names of the places he visited-Constantinople, Trebizond, Kerman, Bukhara, Tabriz, Samarkand, Kashgar, Lanzhou, Suzhow, Khanbaliq, and many others-made such a profound impression on me that I have never forgotten them.

I couldn't help thinking that the world would be a much better place if everyone could experience the kind of cultural awakening that Marco Polo did. I knew even then that I would have to write about the importance of a cultural awakening at some point in my life, although I didn't know how or when.

It took me the better part of thirty years to reach a position where I could think about this task in earnest. When I read somewhere that Gandhi had said, "Be the change you want in the world," I knew the time had come to learn as much as I could about culture and cultures and not just think or dream about them. Nevertheless, it took me

another twenty-five years before I had broadened and deepened my knowledge of culture and cultures sufficiently to write about them. I published a number of books on culture and cultures in the years to follow, including *Culture: Beacon of the Future, Revolution or Renaissance: Making the Transition from an Economic Age to a Cultural Age, The Age of Culture, The Secrets of Culture, The Arts: Gateway to a Fulfilling Life and Cultural Age, The World as Culture: Cultivation of the Soul to the Cosmic Whole,* and now this book. My deep interest in culture also led to creating the World Culture Project to commemorate the United Nations and UNESCO World Decade for Cultural Development from 1988 to 1997. This Project was founded in 1989 and I still direct it today.

As I delved more deeply into the realm of culture, I came to the conclusion that culture and cultures in the all-inclusive, holistic sense as "complex wholes" and "total ways of life"—the way many anthropologists, sociologists, biologists, cultural historians, and others see them—are the real foundations of human existence. I believe that by understanding culture in this specific sense we come to understand the nature of the world at its core and in its fundamental essence, encompassing not only human beings but other species and the world as a whole. I also believe that the great cultural awakening going on at present will open the doors to the creation and development of a cultural age. Such an age will bring with it more peace, harmony, happiness, sustainability, well-being, and equality, as well as making it possible for all people to enjoy a reasonable standard of living and decent quality of life without straining the globe's resources, ecosystems, and finite carrying capacity to the breaking point.

In order to achieve goals as ambitious and worthwhile as these and enjoy all the benefits that can be derived from them, it is necessary to view the world and everything in it from a cultural perspective. As well, we must consider in detail why culture and cultures should evolve from the ground up and not only the top down if a cultural age is to be realized.

The urgency of this task is reinforced by even the most cursory survey of the difficulties, threats, dangers, and challenges facing humanity and the world that have emerged in recent years, whether it is the steady intensification of climate change, the ongoing COVID-19

pandemic, Russia's war on Ukraine, or, as I write the final words in this book, the outbreak of the calamitous conflict between Israel and Hamas in the Middle East.

In this book, I first read the signs and set the stage in considering the importance of culture. This leads to an examination of the vast constellation of cultures that exist in the world. We then move progressively "up the ladder" in practical terms, from the cultures of individuals, children, parents, homes, families, communities, and schools to those of towns, cities, regions, countries, the entire human world, and those of other species. This is followed by an assessment of several foundational requirements, such as the cultural interpretation of history, the centrality of cultural development and policy, ways of opening the doors to a cultural age, strategies to harmonize crucial relationships and cultivate spirituality and compassion, the prerequisites for living in a cultural age, and, finally, an exploration of why it is so essential to make the transition from the present economic age to a future cultural age.

I would like to express my gratitude to many people who have made valuable contributions to my work over many years. First and foremost, I would like to thank my family-my wife Nancy and daughters Charlene and Susan-for their commitment to my research and writing and always being there for me when this was needed the most. I also wish to thank Réal Bédard for his full support of my work and help with my World Culture Project website and computer requirements.
